THE SOUTHERN OCEAN REVEALS ANOTHER ONE OF ITS FASCINATING SECRETS

Work undertaken by **Katya Ovsyanikova** (a lecturer/guide for Heritage Expeditions) for her Masters Degree at the University of Canterbury's Gateway Antarctica, provided evidence (based on photo-identification of individual animals and other characteristics) that at least some of the orcas from the Ross Sea regularly visited northern New Zealand in summer/early autumn.

This was also supported by Italian Researchers who followed satellite tagged animals from Terra Nova Bay to Northern New Zealand during the 2014/15 summer. It is not clear how many animals make this journey, whether they do it annually and most curiously - why?


Katya, who was on a scholarship from the Russian New Zealand Foundation in New Zealand, compiled a photo library of Orcas photographed recently by the Top Predator Alliance project in the Ross Sea region. She then compared them with photos taken in and around New Zealand and in various regions of Antarctica from a catalogue of photos compiled by Orca Researcher Dr Ingrid Visser. Some of the photos in the Top Predator Alliance library and in Dr Visser's library have been taken by participants on our expedition cruises. This underlines one of the important contributions that expeditions such as ours can make to science. Dr Regina Eisert from Gateway Antarctica, the lead scientist on this "Top Predator Alliance" project under whose supervision Katya worked, is keen to see more study done on these Orcas because she says this work only raises more questions than it answers.

This is just one of the many secrets of the Southern Ocean, there are many more yet to be revealed. We are only just starting to understand the region's importance, not only in our weather systems and consequently its role in climate change but its role in the life of those that call it home. The University of Otago has recently obtained approval from the Department of Conservation to establish a research station on the Auckland Islands to start considering some of these questions. The location of New Zealand's Subantarctic Islands makes them the perfect laboratory to study the Southern Ocean. Our many expeditions to these islands provide an opportunity for you to see, to experience and to begin to understand just how important the Subantarctic Islands are as breeding grounds for numerous seabirds and mammals as well as the importance of the Southern Ocean for our planet's health and wellbeing.

Authentic Experiences Abound

I spent several months there aboard our little sailboat, in summer and winter, hiking over, across and around them, seeking out the very best photo opportunities. UPCOMING EXPEDITIONS TO EAST ANTARCTICA

In January 2016 we will embark on our first expedition in some years to Cape Denison in historic Commonwealth Bay, site of the heroic exploits of the Australian Antarctic Expedition of 1911-1914 led by explorer and scientist Sir Douglas Mawson. When a huge iceberg named B90B which had calved from the Ross Ice Shelf grounded at the entrance to the bay in 2009, the sea ice in the bay was prevented from breaking up, effectively barring ships from visiting the area where Mawson's historic huts still stand. According to the few visitors who have used amphibious vehicles or flown in to reach Mawson's huts in the past few years, the structures are holding up well and our team is very excited at the prospect of visiting them again. Our January 2016 expedition is already fully booked, however our December 2016 voyage is now open for sale.

NEW STAFF PROFILE

Dr. Huw Lewis-Jones

Dr. Huw Lewis-Jones is a historian of exploration with a PhD from the University of Cambridge. He was a Curator at the Scott Polar Research Institute and the National Maritime Museum in London and is now an award-winning author. Huw frequently appears on television and radio as a historian, most recently as onscreen expert in the BBC documentaries Wilderness Explored, Frank Wild: Antarctica's Forgotten Hero, and Of Ice and Men.

Huw travelled with us down to the Ice this year, and we asked him to share with us some of his favourite memories from his Antarctic voyage.

'Favourite memory: Just so many, where do I start! I clearly have a thing for old huts, and have guided trips to many others all over the Antarctic Peninsula, but spending time in Captain Scott's hut at Cape Evans is a dream come true for a historian like me. More things, just glimpses of a great voyage: being far south in the Ross Sea as the ice freezes over for the coming winter. Sunsets over Mount Discovery, honouring heroes from the past and making new

friends. Fin whales racing along the ship and surging beneath our bows. Running up the east coast of New Zealand bathed in golden sunlight on our way home. The silence, the immense vistas, the feel of rock in your hands, the taste of true cold. I'm also drawn to islands - the more remote the better. The volcanoes of Ross Island, Inexpressible Island in the far south, and, in the heart of the Southern Ocean, exploring Macquarie, the windswept Auckland Islands, and rugged Campbell Island. It's a haven for the albatross and, simply, my idea of heaven on earth. Can't wait to go back.'

ENDERBY TRUST – CALLING FOR APPLICANTS

The Enderby Trust was founded by the Russ family to provide opportunities for young people to visit remote regions they would not otherwise be able to experience. In this way the family seeks to inspire new generations to appreciate and protect the wild environments explored on Heritage Expeditions voyages.

London based Enderby & Co outfitted vessels for commercial voyages of

discovery and their captains were encouraged to explore beyond the known world at the time. Charles Enderby was a founding member of the Royal Geographical Society and in 1841 was admitted to the Royal Society of London for his "promotion of geographical discovery in the Antarctic regions". Each Enderby Scholar is required to submit a report to the trustees on their return and to share their experiences with others, thus creating further awareness of some of the world's little known regions.

Enderby Trust Scholarships are open to applicants aged 18-30 years old, who would otherwise be unable to travel to the Southern Ocean
